
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#### WHAT IS TOWN PLANNING?

- Understanding of the interaction among the economy, transportation, health and human services, and land-use regulation.
- Ability to solve problems using a balance of technical competence, creativity, and pragmatism.
- Ability to envision alternatives to the physical and social environments in which we live.
- Mastery of geographic information systems and office software.

# **RESPONSIBILITIES OF A PLANNER**

- To serve the Public Interest.
- To diligently and competently perform work on behalf the Client or Employer.
  - To contribute to the development of the Planning Profession and their colleagues.
  - to exhibit and maintain high standards of Personal and Professional integrity, proficiency and knowledge

### Planners Responsibility to the Public

To comply with our obligation to the public, we aspire to the following principles:

- We shall have special concern for the long-range consequences of present actions.
- We shall provide timely, adequate, clear, and accurate information on planning issues to all affected persons and to governmental decision makers.
- We shall give people the opportunity to have a meaningful impact on the development of plans and programs that may affect them.
- We shall **seek social justice** by working to expand choice and opportunity for all persons,
- We shall promote excellence of design and endeavor to conserve and preserve the integrity and heritage of the natural and built environment.
- We shall deal fairly with all participants in the planning process.

#### Planner's Responsibility to the Client or Employer

- We owe diligent, creative, and competent performance of the work we do in pursuit of our client or employer's interest.
- Our commitment to our client shall always be consistent with our faithful service to the public interest.
- We shall exercise independent professional judgment on behalf of our clients and employers.
- We shall avoid a conflict of interest or even the appearance of a conflict of interest in accepting assignments from clients or employers.

#### Planner's Responsibility to the Profession

- We shall contribute to the development of, and respect for our profession by improving knowledge and techniques, making work relevant to solutions of community problems, and increasing public understanding of planning activities.
- We shall educate the public about planning issues and their relevance to our everyday lives.
- We shall describe and comment on the work and views of other professionals in a fair and professional manner.
- We shall share the results of experience and research that contribute to the body of planning knowledge.
- We shall contribute time and resources to the professional development of students, interns, beginning professionals, and other colleagues.
- We shall continue to enhance our professional education and training.
- We shall **systematically and critically analyze ethical issues** in the practice of planning.

### Planners Responsibility to Self

- Act with competence, honesty and integrity;
- Fearlessly and impartially exercise independent professional judgement
  - Discharge duties to employers, clients, colleagues and others with due care and diligence in accordance with the provisions of the code of conduct.
  - Not bring the profession or the Institute into disrepute.

## WHY SHOULD WE KEEP THE FAITH?

- We are in an urban age where global attention is shifting to cities.
